	Amendment to ECCE course
	 Requirement for English 12 to be English 11 instead: rationale is that there is a huge demand for daycare in community and the ECE assistant program is a stepping stone to diploma.
	Many students did not meet the English 12 requirement
	• Other programs that offer ECCA certificates, at UBC TEFL is the requirement, so as the first course that introduces students to the program; it could be English 11.
	 Addition on CIM 70% requirement achievement in each course, 2.67 GPA minimum.

	Look to ban e-Proctoring software
	Academic integrity is not just about telling instructors what to do
	 Instructors might make decisions that go against govt.
	This is also to protect students' academic freedom.
	• Academic freedom will be protected by banning the e-Proctoring software.
	• Faculty in other institutional discussions were mixed about using it.
	• There are ethical guidelines for using facial recognition software.
	 This technology is not particularly bad, but the small amount of transparency regarding using this data is what the operational problem with current offerings is.



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	• Operationally speaking we do not have the means to support this through IT or COLT.
	• This raises the question as to why we are using it; ban it until we have a procedure in place.
	 Another point of view: don't ban it entirely but until the ethical issues can be worked out
	 Questions about privacy of student information, ethical guidelines, transparency and racial bias.
	 College and IT have already identified that we should not be using anything that stores information in the US. –what happens to the facial recognition data?
	• We do not know where the data goes; we cannot support something that is so apparently contrary to our policies.
	 If proctoring software is used, there should also be an alternative provided to the students.
	BC Deans do not support it.
	• We are moving away from a virtual world.
